About the Ambassador Program

The Fair Ambassador program is a youth leadership development program. It is an opportunity for young adults to participate in a community event that allows them to gain hard and soft skills to help prepare them for their future. Those skills include, but are not limited to: leadership and presentation skills such as public speaking, networking, interviewing, and learning to interact as a professional, as well as making friendships that last a lifetime. Other benefits include a recommendation from the Board of Directors, which can be used when applying for employment or post-secondary education, a bursary, opportunities to learn more about agriculture and the local community, and many chances to meet new people, enjoy new experiences, and have fun!

To qualify:

- You must be between the ages of 17 and 24, be unmarried, and have no children
- Be a resident of Kinmount and/or reside within the catchment area of Fenelon Fall Secondary School or Haliburton Highlands Secondary School (not sure if your address meets this guideline? Visit mybustoschool.ca and search for grade 9-12 in Trillium Lakelands District School Board)
- Have not previously reigned as Ambassador of any fair
- Be willing to assume all duties of the Fair Ambassador at the 2025 Kinmount Fair, Aug 29, 30, and 31, 2025
- Assist in presentations for various events during the fair.
- Be willing to attend events, represent and promote the fair at various agricultural events, including the OAAS Convention in February and the CNE Ambassador Program in August.

Components of the program include:

- An interview of approximately 10 minutes in length
- On stage introduction – approximately 200 words to introduce yourself
- Two-minute speech about agricultural practices or issues, rural life and related activities or some aspect of the Kinmount Fair.

General Rules and Regulations for all Exhibitor Classes

1. None but members of the Kinmount Agricultural Society (the Society) will be allowed to compete for prizes.
 - a. The membership fee for 2025 shall be \$15.00.
2. All animals and articles must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor.
3. The judges shall have the power to decide whether the animal or article is worthy of a prize. Where there is little or no competition, the judges are to decide what prizes are warranted, if any, but cannot change entries from one class to another.
4. Exhibitors showing only in Parade Classes must ensure that the Fair Board Secretary has a record of your name and address.
5. The Society will not be responsible for any accident on the track or the grounds.
6. No person shall be allowed to interfere with the judges.
7. The decision of the judges is final.
8. If any dispute occurs, the Treasurer will hold prize money until such dispute is settled.
9. No prizes will be paid out on the day of the show. Note: This rule does not apply to Classes in the Junior Division.
10. All exhibits are shown at owner's risk against loss or damage.
11. No exhibitor or spectator shall be allowed to show disrespect or use abusive language to any official. Violators may be removed from the fair grounds.
12. A percentage only of prize money will be paid if directors consider the receipts insufficient to pay in full.
13. The Society reserves the right to interpret its own Rules and Regulations. Should any dispute or question arise not provided for in these rules and regulations, the decision of the Board of Directors will be final.
14. Parties violating any of these rules will be subject to expulsion from the Society and forfeit all prizes they may be entitled to.

Rules and Regulations for Exhibit Hall Classes

1. These rules and regulations apply to Classes 38-46 inclusive, including lettered classes.
2. All general rules and regulations apply to Exhibit Hall Classes.
3. In all articles of manufacture, grain, seeds, and produce, no person shall enter in the same class more than one article of each kind, which must be their own manufacture or growth.
4. All vegetables to be grown in 2025. All fruits, etc. must be correctly named on each exhibit.
5. **Exhibit Hall Drop-off and Pick-up Schedule** - Exhibit Hall entries will be accepted on Wednesday and Thursday before Labour Day, Wednesday from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. and Thursday from 8 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Judging of hall exhibits will commence at 2 p.m. Thursday. The Hall will be open for viewing by visitors Friday, Saturday & Sunday. The Exhibit Hall will close Sunday at 5 p.m. to prepare for the removal of exhibits at 5:15 p.m. One helper only is allowed. Exhibits may not be removed prior to this time. All exhibitors are responsible for picking up their goods in a timely fashion. The Exhibit Hall will close at 6 p.m. Sunday. **This schedule is subject to change. All updates will be posted to our website, kinmountfair.net.**

Tips for Exhibit Hall Classes

1. To avoid line-ups and delays, please make every effort to pre-register your exhibits online with AssistExpo at kinmountfair.net or with the fair board secretary by the Tuesday before Labour Day. A printable entry form is also available online that can be submitted by email to info@kinmountfair.net or mailed in if electronic submission is not possible.

2. ***NEW* Entry tags will no longer be mailed out.** Blank entry tags will be available in advance at the following locations from July 15th, 2025:

 - b. Select other locations - check our website or Facebook page for updates, or contact us.
3. The busiest time for receiving entries is Thursday between 10:30 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. Try to come on Wednesday evening or early Thursday morning to avoid delays and line-ups. Make sure your entry tags have your name on them before putting your exhibits on display!
4. If you have difficulty determining the Class and/or Section numbers to use for your entries, don't hesitate to consult with the exhibit hall staff. They are there to help make the process easier for everyone!

OAAS Competitions

The 1st place entries for all sections that are Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (OAAS) competitions are eligible for entry in the District 4 competition held in the fall. Exhibit Hall Divisions Entry Instructions

How do I enter my items for judging in the Exhibit Hall?

1. Obtain an exhibitor number. This can be done by registering your entries online, by sending in your entry form in advance, or by visiting the registration table at the Exhibit Hall during the drop-off times. Additional details for entering online are available on AssistExpo.
2. Ensure that each item being entered has an entry tag affixed. The entry tag must be completed with the **class, section, description, and your exhibitor number**. Blank entry tags will be available in advance in Kinmount at select locations. Otherwise they can be picked up from the Secretary's Office (Tuesday or Wednesday week of the fair) or at the registration desk at drop-off time.
3. Print your online registration confirmation form or complete your entry form. Entry forms are available at the the registration desk at drop-off time. **Ensure that all of the following information is complete:**
 - a. Exhibitor number
 - b. Address
 - c. Name
 - d. Age (for Junior Division)
 - e. Contact information
 - f. Class and section number for each item entered
4. If you have any questions, feel free to ask the volunteers at the exhibit hall at drop-off times.
5. When all of your items are prepared with entry tags affixed, leave your items in the designated area.
6. Submit your entry form to the registration desk prior to leaving. **Please do not take this form home.** It is incredibly important that the Exhibit Hall volunteers have this form to assist with entries and results.

Guidelines for all Horticulture Division Classes

Director-in-Charge (Classes 38V, 38F, 39): Guy Scott -

Following are some guidelines suggested for entries in Class 38-40 of the Horticultural Division. These guidelines are taken from the "Ontario Judging Standards," published by the Ontario Horticultural Association and/or the Garden Clubs of Ontario in co-operation with the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food, and Rural Affairs, which is available for purchase at a moderate price. This booklet provides you with everything necessary for successful entry in competitions in Classes 38, 39 and 40.

Preparation of Entries

1. List or mark on the following schedule, the plants you have grown that are or will be, at the proper stage for exhibiting, including the "any other" categories.
2. Cut flowers and foliage the evening before the show or in the early morning, selecting specimens of quality.
3. Preparing Materials for Hardening
 - a. Remove lower foliage cleanly. Upper foliage must be attached unless otherwise stated.
 - b. Specimen blooms must be disbudded. In fact, good exhibitors will often disbud weeks before the show.
 - c. Make a fresh slanting cut at the end of the stems, for maximum water intake.
 - d. Place in a wide bucket in deep warm water, preferably overnight.
 - e. Store in a cool, dark, humid, draft-free place.

4. Conditioning - It is well known that some cut flowers, foliage and woody materials do not readily absorb water, and require further treatment prior to hardening, to prevent wilting during the show.
 - a. Flowering branches generally benefit from splitting the cut ends, although some require removal of the thick outer layer as well.
 - b. Some cut flowers (e.g. poppies) benefit from burning the stem ends, while others benefit from placing stem ends in boiling water or from chemicals in the water. Details are available in floral books.
5. Preparation of Specimens for Showing
 - a. removal of dust, stains, pollen and any other foreign material.
 - b. re-cut stem ends before placing in show containers.
6. Some Cautions
 - a. a bud showing colour is considered a bloom, which upsets the bloom count
 - b. only self-foliage is permitted to be attached, unless otherwise stated in the schedule
 - c. wiring, oiling, spraying and artificial colouring is prohibited in the Horticultural Division
7. Placing Entries
 - a. Exhibitors are responsible for placing entries in proper classes
 - b. Show directors can assist exhibitors to avoid errors in placing entries and ensure they qualify within the limits prescribed in the schedule

8. Guidelines and Terminology

- a. Uniformity – specimens in an entry of a given cultivar should be as uniform as possible in size, form, and colour. When several cultivars are involved, they may vary in size and colour, but should be at a uniform stage of development.
- b. Form – should be characteristic of the cultivar. Thin shallow blooms, or distorted or immature blooms, are not of exhibition quality.
- c. Size and Colour – according to the cultivar
- d. Substance – freshness and turgidity are evidence of good substance and lasting quality
- e. Stem and Foliage – the stem should be of good proportion, sufficiently strong and stiff to support the bloom, but not coarse. Only attached self-foliage is permitted, unless otherwise stated.
- f. Condition and Grooming – entries should be at the proper stage of maturity, turgid and free of mechanical injury, insects, disease, and spray blemishes. Flowers and foliage should display evidence of good culture and grooming.
